



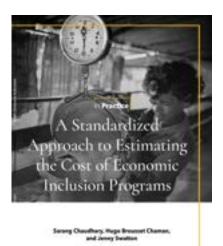

## Government of Rwanda Integrates National Strategy for Sustainable Graduation

The Government of Rwanda's adoption of the <u>National Strategy for</u> <u>Sustainable Graduation (NSSG)</u> represents a notable commitment to empowering people in poverty to develop sustainable livelihoods and establish a pathway out of poverty as part of the Government's broader efforts to eradicate extreme poverty by 2030. As one of the first national-level policies committed to ending extreme poverty through the Graduation approach, the Government of Rwanda demonstrates the potential to adopt evidence-based models to address large-scale challenges like extreme poverty.

#### Building Climate Resilience for Women in Extreme Poverty: Adaptations and Policy Recommendations from the Government of Tunisia's Pilot Graduation Program

## Considerations for Integrating the Graduation Approach within Resilience Food Security Activities

Given the synergies between the graduation approach and many of the programming interventions typically included in Resilience Food Security Activities (RFSAs), the IDEAL activity under USAID commissioned a study of prevailing practices in adapting and integrating the graduation approach within RFSAs. This report focuses on three activities, two in Uganda, and one in Bangladesh. All three RFSAs in this study implemented all core graduation components, with variations based on local contexts and layering.

#### Program Targeting with Machine Learning and Mobile Phone Data: Evidence from an Anti-Poverty Intervention in Afghanistan

Can mobile phone data improve program targeting? By combining rich survey data from the baseline of a "big push" anti-poverty program in Afghanistan implemented in 2016 with detailed mobile phone logs from program beneficiaries, this paper studies the extent to which machine learning methods can accurately differentiate ultra-poor households eligible for program benefits from ineligible households.
