## Economic inclusion shows promise in fragile contexts

A new working paper from the World Bank's Development Impact Evaluation Group, No Household Left Behind: Afghanistan Targeting the Ultra Poor Impact Evaluation, tests whether a multifaceted economic inclusion project can reduce poverty in one of the most difficult settings in the world: Afghanistan.

The work showcases the potential of the Targeting the Ultra Poor (TUP) package as an effective tool for reducing poverty, improving gender equality, and strengthening financial inclusion in a fragile and conflict-affected context. One year after the program ended, the randomized controlled trial study finds significant impacts across all primary outcomes considered: consumption, assets, food security, labor, financial inclusion, women's empowerment, and overall psychological well-being. Per capita consumption increases by 30% with respect to the control group, and the share of households below the national poverty line decreases by 20 percentage points to 62% in the treatment group. Access to finance significantly improves: TUP households saved on average US\$31 more than the control group (average savings balance of US\$1). The report also includes a cost benefit analysis, estimating the return against the increase in consumption, and finds a return of US\$2.30 for every dollar spent.

# Exploring links between social assistance and economic inclusion

The Indonesian government seeks to create stronger synergies between its conditional cash transfer program and income-generating interventions for the poor. In May 2019, the Development Planning Agency (BAPPENAS) and MAHKOTA, an Australian-funded national social protection policy program, hosted the Linking Social Protection to Sustainable Livelihoods: A Way Forward for Indonesia conference. Colleagues from the governments of Paraguay and the Philippines, and economic inclusion experts from BRAC and Fundación Capital, gathered with Indonesian policy makers to share their experiences.
